Exploring our Faith

GOD DOES NOT NEED MY VOTE

"Oh Lord, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not listen? ... Destruction and violence are before me; strife and contention arise." Whether it is news about environmental degradation, or about the undermining of the democratic process, news about migrants dying as they try to reach a place of safety or news about the violence in Yemen or Syria or Hong Kong, news about increases in gun violence in Toronto or about the recent spate of suicides in New Brunswick, my response echoes the cry that Habakkuk gave voice to over 2500 years ago. Over and over I read articles or hear interviews asking if there is any way to counter the growing societal despair. Like Habakkuk, we are questioning whether there is anything for us to look at other than wrongdoing and trouble. And today, like Habakkuk we receive the response that God still has a vision and a plan and the counter to despair is to keep working toward that vision and that plan no matter how impossible it seems.



We have been named children of God. That identity is enough to assure us that no matter how difficult life may get, there will come a time when, in the words of Julian of Norwich, "all will be well, and all will be well, and all manner of things will be well." Every choice that we make should be with that certainty in our mind.

In the gospel reading the apostles appear to have lost that certainty. They ask Jesus to increase their faith. Based on Jesus' response, it appears that they were asking for an increase in faith as reward for what they had done and as motivation to keep going. Jesus compares their request to that of a slave who wants to sit down and relax before the master has eaten, something no master

would offer. Since we do not live in a society that accepts slavery, I will suggest an alternative comparison for today. When we feel like giving up on the gospel and say that we need more from God to keep us motivated to make sacrifices to care for the poor or reach out to the stranger or act as good stewards of creation, when we threaten to stop trying because we have "been there and done that," we are like employees who work for the morning and then say to the boss, "I've done as much as I feel like doing for the day, I will need a bonus if you want me to do anything other than play computer games for the afternoon."

When I complain to God, I'm acting as if I expect God to work a little harder to earn my vote. Today's scripture readings remind me that God is not a politician up for re-election and faithfulness is not a vote for me to bargain with. It is not God who has stopped working to change the world and bring about a kingdom of peace, justice, compassion and equality. It is me who becomes so caught up in my own perspective that I want the rest of the world to change around me, without having to change myself. "Look at the proud person! Their spirit is not right in them, but the righteous person lives by their faith."



It is important that those who are sick, and those around them, understand the significance of the Anointing of the Sick as a **sacrament of healing.** Who should celebrate this sacrament?

- Those who are elderly and whose frailty is becoming more pronounced
- Those adults and children who are suffering from a major illness. Illness comes in many different forms; physical, mental, psychological, emotional, and spiritual
- Those who are facing or recovering from surgery or serious medical tests
- Those suffering from a serious accident
- Those who suffer from chronic illness such as arthritis or diabetes
- Those who care for the sick, especially those who are closely bound in love to them

Family in Crisis – A family in our parish grouping is currently living a difficult journey. Their young daughter has been diagnosed with Heller's Syndrome, a rare developmental disorder, affecting children. With this, many things a child has learned (like speech, social function, motor skills) are lost. You can liken it to dementia in an older person and how ordinary things become forgotten and difficult. Right now, this family's 14-year old daughter is in hospital, scared and confused as her brain continues to change and she continues to forget. In her terror, she is prone to hurt herself, unable to understand, unable to sit still in her fear, always in panic. The family is trying to find a safe and loving placement for their daughter, as they can no longer ensure her safety at home. The only youth facility known to them is full and has a waiting list. There would be compensation from the Province for the right person/people trained to work with youth, trained to manage aggression and confusion. If anyone knows of people

who open their home to those with severe conditions, please contact the parish office and please, pray for the family.

- Attend the Pancake Breakfast fundraiser on October 19th!



Redefining Palliative Care for the 21st Century - On October 19th Pamela Mansfield MD, CCFP (PC), Palliative Care Division Head, Moncton Hospital and Assistant Professor, Dalhousie University will join us to talk about journeying / accompanying those who live with chronic / terminal illness.
