



Exploring Our Faith

AT THE END OF THE DAY, IT'S ALL ABOUT LOVE

How quickly life can change. That is never more apparent than in the two readings we hear this morning from Matthew's Gospel. In the first, Jesus is the toast of the town as he enters Jerusalem. Crowds are gathering to offer praise, going so far as to spread their cloaks on the road. By the time we get to the second Gospel, crowds have again gathered (probably a lot of the same people), but for an entirely different purpose. The shouts of "Hosanna" have turned into "Crucify Him". If you will allow me, I would like to draw comparison from the crowds in our Gospel stories to our own journeys in faith.



Recently I have had the chance to take part in a few different formation events. Each event was filled with people from

different churches who I do not work with on a regular basis or even know. For me, it is always interesting to hear other people share their experience of God in their lives and how they share that experience through their ministry in faith formation. What has come to the forefront more than anything else is how much we (I am generalizing here) have moved into our head and out of our heart when we talk about God. We quote verses in Scripture that support our own image of God, or we refer to laws and rules that clearly define where people belong and what they are entitled to.

In a conversation about vows, a close friend said to me recently: "My marriage vows, when you break them down mean one thing, 'I'm with you, no matter what.' My vows as a Christian are just as simple. 'Love God, love yourself, love your neighbour.'" Instantly it reminded me of an old song by The Essex entitled "Easier Said Than Done". In hearing her say this, I came to the realization that love comes from my heart and not my head. All the other stuff, all the ologies, which are valuable to a degree (no pun intended) come from my head. Jesus lives in my heart. I need to spend more time with him there.

I think that for all our good intentions, we have removed love from the equation, and leaned perhaps more than we should on judgment. Most Christians I know (and I include myself), if asked, would be proud to proclaim their belief in Jesus and in God. However, talk is cheap. How does my life reflect what I claim to be my beliefs? Do I believe that this Jesus, who welcomes me to his table every Sunday welcomes the divorced person sitting behind me, or the single mom in the next section, or the gay or trans person sitting at the back, afraid to move to the front?

If you had asked me that question in my younger years, my answer would have been immediate and clear with little or no thought. I would have passed judgment in an instant. Now, in my older years I look at things a little differently. My beliefs can only inform how I live my life and the decisions I make. They cannot, and will not, guide the decisions of others. Even my own children make choices that probably wouldn't be my choice. Even when they do, they are still welcome at the table for Sunday dinner. Passing judgment on anyone is not my job, and I don't want it. My job is to love and accompany. I will leave the judgment to God. As a Christian, I claim to be a follower of Jesus Christ. The one who ate with sinners and hung around with people who got it wrong far more than with people who got it right. He is my model. So, I cannot be a *CINO* (Christian in Name Only). I can't say one thing, "Hosanna to the Son of David (I believe in Jesus Christ) and do another, Crucify Him (you aren't welcome at the same table as me).

On this journey of life, I believe we are making judgments every day. My challenge before I make any decision is to ask myself, "What is my most loving response to this situation?" and do it. After all, isn't that what Jesus did when he decided to leave the garden.

HOLY WEEK

Palm branches, a basin for washing feet, broken bread, the Cross, and the empty tomb are the entry ways into Holy Week, the portals into the Mystery of God. This

week, Holy Week, will be the holiest week of our lives or, at least, it has the potential to be. Like all things that begin, grow, progress, and evolve, getting the beginning right is key to the whole endeavor. I used to think that if I entered Holy Thursday well-disposed in my mind and in my heart, then the rest of the Triduum (Holy Thursday to Easter Sunday) would look after itself. Now, I've backed it up to Passion Sunday; if I do that well, I'm convinced the rest will flow

If I have learned anything, from past Holy Weeks, about the art of "letting go," I can only credit Jesus for showing me that path. He let the donkey take him into Jerusalem (Passion/Palm Sunday).

He let go of his life by putting it in the hands of his apostles in the form of bread and wine (Holy Thursday). He let go of his physical life on the Cross (Good Friday). He relinquished all control wrapped in a burial cloth and hidden in the darkness of a tomb (Holy Saturday). Finally, he allowed his Father to raise him to new life (Easter Sunday). That's a lot of allowing, a lot of letting go, a lot of surrender. It all starts for us with the words, "This is the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ."

There is a clear difference between a life of *action* and a life of *passion*, both for Jesus and for us. The life of action is mostly what we live in the first half of our lives, while the life of passion becomes more evident in the second half of our lives. In the life of action, our earlier years, we are making things happen. We feel we are controlling our destiny—what we want to give to life and mostly what we want to get out of life. In the driver's seat, with the steering wheel in our hands, we move through life under no one's agenda but our own.

However, usually in the second half of life--and when something major doesn't work out according to our plans--we learn the hard lesson that we never were in control as we once thought. A disability, a failed marriage, a dead-end job, a mental breakdown, a car accident, or a death that wasn't supposed to happen and guess what? We are on the donkey, heading into Jerusalem, and entering into our own passion.

Jesus' life was a ministry of healing, caring, performing miracles, teaching, confronting, and consoling. Until he headed into Jerusalem, for the last time, Jesus clearly was

a man of action. Once he mounted the donkey, the action stopped. Instead of *doing* things, Jesus allowed things to *be done* to him. Once in Jerusalem, he was judged, ridiculed, spat upon, whipped, crowned with thorns, and crucified. He was also raised to new life.

Passion comes from the Greek word pathos which means "to suffer." When we can't control the circumstances of life, we suffer them. What we can't change (fix, undo, re-do, rearrange, or even understand), those things change us.

While being the man of action all through the gospels, Jesus ultimately fulfilled his life not in action but in passion. Once he surrendered (that first

Passion Sunday), his life was in the hands of others (Pilate, Caiaphas, soldiers, angry crowds, dishonest religious leaders). Most importantly, Jesus never forgot that his life was always in the hands of God, regardless.

I invite you to allow Holy Week to take you where you need to go and not necessarily where you would like to go. Relinquish the steering wheel, in fact, give up the driver's seat altogether. Wash feet and allow someone to wash your feet on Holy Thursday. Stand in the shadow of the Cross on Good Friday and allow every helpless moment to have its hour. Permit Holy Saturday to be a day of silence. Just consent to silence even though you would like to shout out against every injustice you have ever encountered. Come to the Easter Vigil and/or Easter Sunday Mass and allow one more thing—allow God to raise up, to new life, everything that has ever felt like death. Jesus fulfilled his life not in action but in passion. So will we. Passion (suffering) is much harder to live that action. Control, especially in the first half of life, seems much more attractive than surrender.

If palm branches, foot-washing, bread, Cross, and empty tombs are the doors to Holy Week, then passion (surrender) is the key that opens those doors.

Have a blessed Holy Week. See you on the other side of resurrection. I know how the story ends.

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


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
