





EXPLORING OUR FAITH

HOSPITALITY? FAR FROM IT



Read on, if you dare. The following is not very flattering. It doesn't paint us in a good light. It's not meant to offend anyone, although the ego in all of us is highly offendable. It's meant to wake us up. The truth has a way of doing that, if we allow it. It's concerning hospitality or, more to the point, our lack of hospitality. I'm going to quote a letter I received recently from a man of faith, not a complainer. This is his experience. Unfortunately, if I had decided to keep all the similar letters I received since I was ordained 27 years ago, I would have a file

folder full. I wish it was a one-off, a rare occurrence, an exception to the rule, but it's not. With his permission, I give you most of what he wrote.

Dear Phil,

"....On Christmas Eve I decided to go to Immaculate Heart Parish to celebrate with the community Christmas mass at 8h30. I have to say that what took place for me kind of caught me off guard, and this is what I wanted to share with you.

When I came in there was a welcoming group of people at the entrance of the church saying "Hi" and offering Christmas wishes to those coming in, and I heard some being called by their names, and I found that really beautiful. But to my surprise when they saw me, no one said a word, nothing. Not "welcome." Not "Merry Christmas." Just silence. So, I decided to go sit in a pew and wait for the celebration to start. Where I was sitting, the pew in front of me was filled from one end to the other. The pew in front of them was also filled and the pew behind had a couple sitting in it. I found myself alone in my pew, and that was ok. What really surprised me was when we came to the "sign of peace." Everyone in the front pew started hugging each other and offering the sign of peace and did the same with those sitting in the pew in front of them. What I didn't expect was the fact that no one turned around to offer me a sign of peace. I then turned around to the couple sitting in the pew behind me, and they just refused to offer anything to me. I saw then shaking hands with those behind them and wishing them Merry Christmas. But when they turned around and saw me, they just put there hands on their chest, backed away, and looked at me in an odd way. I was just left there being ignored by those who came to celebrate Eucharist and apparently call themselves Christians. It was kind of a bitter sweet moment. It's Christmas Eve, and I wanted to celebrate with those who believe, like me, in the meaning of Christmas and then finding myself treated like this brought a lot of sadness. While I was there alone in my pew, a woman (I believe an immigrant because her English was very broken and difficult to understand) sitting in a pew in the other aisle, saw what happened to me, and walked across her pew where she was sitting alone, crossed the aisle, and walked along my pew to come up to me, gave me a hug, and wished me peace in a very broken English. When she turned around and walked back to her pew, I was left wondering who was Christian and who shared the peace of Christ? I just wanted to share this with you, Phil. What made it so sad for me was, when I walked out of the church, the first thing that passed through my thoughts was, "I'm not sure if I will ever come back to have a similar experience."

I just wanted to share this with you as someone who came to the parish and experienced just being a nobody to the people where I sat in this church..."

There were a few more lines to the letter, that expressed gratitude and was more positive. I responded by apologizing on behalf of the parish, by thanking him for his faith, for not being bitter, and for telling us the truth. The immigrant woman was the true Christian, the authentic witness of Christ in the world. I told him that this woman remind me of the one leper in the Scriptures (of 10!) who returned to give thanks to God. That leper got it. This woman got it. The gospel was on display in this one woman who knew what welcoming Christ was all about.

I also reminded this man, in my response, that what he brought to light is, unfortunately, more common than any of us good Catholics want to admit. The lie we keep telling ourselves is, "this would never happen in my parish...maybe in someone else's."

In a response to my response, he wrote back. Again, he came across gracious and not bitter. In that letter he expressed how he felt this same close-minded attitude in many of the French-speaking churches and not just at Immaculate Heart of Mary. This doesn't exactly make me feel a whole lot better. I guess this coldness and lack of hospitality is pervasive.

He was able to name in his second letter to me exactly what I was already thinking. Much of the core problem is as he writes, "this kind of personal religion between me and God and my little group." He is so right.

Like I said at the beginning, I wish this was just one person's bad experience and nothing more. Unfortunately, it's not. This is a wake-up call. We are not as welcoming as we thought we were. Walmart greeters do it better than we do. Hospitality, before it's a handshake, a greeting, or even a smile is, first and foremost, an attitude.

I leave the second last word to this same man who had the courage to write me:

"Anyway, if any of my experience can be of help to you using it with the parish, I have no issues in granting you permission to use it. My hope is that perhaps people can have the attitude of the migrant woman who should me what Christmas is all about."

I give the last word to Jesus who reminds us of what we will ultimately be judged by—I was a stranger and you either welcomed me or you didn't (Mt. 25:35-40).

Fr. Phil
